Lamar State College Orange hosted three commencement ceremonies during the 2023-2024 academic year, two of which were record-breaking ceremonies. The graduation record was first broken with 327 degrees and certificates awarded to 244 graduates at Fall commencement on Friday, December 15, 2023. This represents more than a 12% increase in the number of graduates from last year's Fall commencement in December 2022.

On Friday, May 10 at Spring commencement, another graduation record was broken with 438 certificates and degrees awarded to 349 graduates. This represents an impressive 46% increase in the number of graduates over last year's Spring commencement in May 2023.

"The remarkable commitment and perseverance demonstrated by each student who crossed the stage is truly inspiring," said Dr. Wendy Elmore, Provost and Executive Vice President. "Many of our students balance the demands of full-time employment while pursuing their education. Every one of them should take pride in the profound statement that a certificate or degree from Lamar State College Orange makes about their character and determination."

Anthony Barnes

Anthony Barnes wasn't sure what he wanted to do after he received his high school diploma. He contemplated attending a four-year university, going straight into the workforce, or even joining the military. But once he learned more about Lamar State College Orange, he knew it was the perfect fit.

In his first years at LSCO, Barnes became passionate about his pathway after he took an anatomy and physiology course through which he built a relationship with his professor and a sense of community among his peers. He not only built a community within his major but also in his student organizations and job experiences. Barnes participated as a member of the Quiz Bowl team, Student Government Association, and worked as a student mentor in the Gator Success Center.

His involvement on campus allowed Barnes to bond with his fellow Gators and attend events he would not have known about otherwise. Barnes has made plans to become a college professor once he obtained a fouryear degree in biology and earned a Ph.D. Barnes has ambitions that he would make a return to LSCO as a professor after a part-time job or internship in the health profession.



Michael Martin

Martin is an avid writer and published author. He discovered his love for writing in fourth grade when he was assigned to write a poem but submitted a descriptive story instead. His teacher was so impressed with his unique work that she shared it with his mother. This was when his passion to create and share stories with others took root.

Martin, originally from Southeast Idaho, drove a truck for many years to provide for his family while spending several of his off-duty hours writing and furthering his education online. A back injury forced Martin and his family to relocate to Bridge City for work. Years after the move, his back injury worsened requiring surgery, but operation failed, leaving Martin disabled. He viewed this news as positive, an opportunity to dive into his passions, to pursue an education, and write a book. After a couple of semesters, he released his book, The Curse of the Obsidian Template.

Martin battled with achieving his standard of perfection when comparing his work to other writers'. However, through applying advice he received from two of his professors to his life, he got the courage to share his book with others. Martin now hopes to encourage others to do the same.



Kimberlyn Carter

Kimberlyn is a Lamar State College Orange student with a passion for mental health advocacy. She wrote a poem titled A Letter to my Mental **Health** inspired by her own struggles with mental well-being. Through tragic loss and devastating news, Carter found an outlet in writing.

In February of 2021, Kimberlyn was ecstatic to learn she was pregnant. Sadly, only a month later, she suffered an unexpected and disheartening miscarriage. To make matters worse she was told that if she could not conceive within a year, she would be required to undergo a hysterectomy, leaving her unable to have children. This drove her further down a dark road mentally leaving her feeling isolated and depressed. With seemingly nowhere left to turn, Carter shocked herself by putting pen to paper to convey her story through poetry.

Through her writing, she hopes her work reaches an audience that can resonate with her past mental health struggles to help others feel less alone and find a voice. Carter has since overcome her battle with depression and went on to have a baby girl in December of 2022. Carter now wants to give her past pain a purpose and

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
Gatorama

Joe Ben Welch Student Center

Student Center Gets a New Name

Lamar State College Orange hosted a dedication ceremony on Thursday, April 4, 2024 for the newly named, Joe Ben Welch Student Center in honor of the first president of Lamar State College Orange who served from 1969 to 1989.

Dr. Joe Ben Welch was a member of the faculty when Lamar University's extension center opened in 1969 and was appointed director of the Orange Center serving as president until his departure in 1989. Dr. Welch guided the college from its infancy to independent status as a separately accredited, degree–granting institution, leaving behind a legacy that continues to this day.

The college began in the former Tilley Elementary School in the fall of 1969 with 345 students. After Tilley Elementary burned down in 1971, Dr. Welch was instrumental in leading the community to raise funds to rebuild the campus where it is today. "The Student Center is one of those buildings he worked to establish so it is only fitting that it be named in his honor," said Dr. Thomas Johnson, President of LSCO.



Dr. Welch received his bachelor's degree from Louisiana Tech University, master's degree from Lamar University, and doctorate from McNeese State University. After leaving Orange, he served as president of Middle Georgia College from 1989 to 1998. He then became the founding president of River Parishes Community College in 1999.

The student center name was unveiled during Gatorama 2024, LSCO's Spring Day & Open House. Friends and family were in attendance to witness his legacy enshrined.





Addressing Southeast Texas Nursing Needs

The Texas Board of Nursing recently approved the Standalone Generic Associate Degree Nursing Program to be introduced to LSCO in January 2025. This will allow students the opportunity to complete a full two-year RN program.

This program will educate future nurses in the classroom and provide them with hands-on experience to apply course knowledge through simulation and clinicals. These classes cover material in medical-surgical, geriatric, maternal/child health, pediatrics, and mental health nursing. It provides intensive preparation to best equip students to step into the medical field.

The hope in introducing this new two-year degree track is to fulfill the needs of the community and nursing students. It will present a new opportunity to receive an associate's degree in nursing in Orange County. It will benefit the surrounding communities to have registered nurses stepping up to fill the current surplus of vacancies in RN positions.

"This program is important to help reduce the nursing shortage here in Southeast Texas and Southwest Louisiana." Dean of Nursing and Health Professions, Mandee Tucker, said. "The standalone ADN program aims to decrease these shortages and provide qualified, highly-trained nurses to our communities."

Applications for the ADN Program will open in Fall of 2024. Classes will begin the following January for the 2025 Spring semester. The Nursing Department is excited to see the growth this program will bring to LSCO and the communities.

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Innovation Takes Center Stage

A Grand Debut for Electromechanical Technology Buildings

Lamar State College Orange celebrated the grand opening of the Electromechanical Technology Buildings with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Wednesday, September 27, 2023.

The two buildings combined provide more than 12,000 square feet of space for instruction in areas such as hydraulics, pneumatics, electrical, machining and equipment installation to name a few. The buildings are also home to an innovative makerspace, laser engraver, and 3d printing equipment for students.

Located on the corner of Green and 1st Street, the property was previously home to the headquarters of the Procell Brothers Performance Center and Procell Machine Shop, known for building high-quality racecar engines responsible for earning 23 National Hot Rod Association world records. With the standard set high for developing champions, LSCO purchased the property in 2021 with the intent to carry on the tradition of excellence set by the Procell brothers.

"We're excited to continue offering high-quality education in these high-demand industries" said Dr. Keith Jones, Associate Dean of Technical Studies. "These newly renovated buildings offer the space and tools necessary to train the next generation of industry leaders."





Maritime Mobile Training Unit

Providing Access to Quality Hands-On Training

LSCO received a \$500,000 Maritime Mobile Training Unit. This new unit will be useful for many different programs offered at Lamar State College Orange. This purchase was made possible with funds from Texas Reskilling and Upskilling Through Education (TRUE). The production of this customized simulation unit was a five-month long process. It was designed intentionally in accordance with industry recommendations, and will be certified by the U.S. Coast Guard.

Students in the Electromechanical, Maritime, Instrumentation, and Logistics programs will gain direct experience in their fields thanks to the Maritime Mobile Training Unit. This will improve the quality of training and expertise for each of these career paths. The allocation of this training unit will provide a vital contribution to the success of students. It will improve the skills and safety of those stepping into our local industries.











Unveiling Satellite Location in Lumberton, Texas

Lamar State College Orange unveiled its first satellite location in Lumberton with a grand opening and ribbon-cutting ceremony on Wednesday, October 18, 2023. The newly renovated, 3,000 square foot site located at 344 S. Main Street houses two multi-purpose classrooms, a reception area, a conference area, and office space for support staff.

LSCO has seen record growth recently with an impressive 11.73% enrollment increase from Fall 2021 to Fall 2022, making the college the second fastest growing institution out of the 53 two-year colleges in Texas. Currently, LSCO is home to more than 550 students from Hardin County accounting for nearly 20% of total enrollment.

"Lumberton and Hardin County have seen some incredible expansion over the past decade," said Dr. Tom Johnson, President of Lamar State College Orange. "We believe that this building represents just the beginning of a growing relationship between LSCO and the Lumberton and Hardin County communities."

LSCO's dual credit partnership with Lumberton ISD is vibrant and expanding with more than 450 students currently enrolled in dual credit courses. Students have the opportunity as early as their 10th grade year to earn college credit in programs like nursing, criminal justice, welding, business and more.

"Our dual credit partnership with Lumberton ISD gives students an amazing opportunity to

earn college credit while still in high school in high-demand programs that are critical to the continued growth of Lumberton and Hardin County," said Dr. Wendy Elmore, Provost and Executive Vice President of LSCO.

The building previously served as a medical clinic for Lumberton area residents before it was purchased by LSCO in 2022. Renovations began in January 2023 and classes began in Spring 2024.

"Our mission at LSCO is simply transforming lives and communities. This new facility is in the right place at the right time for students and the Lumberton community," said President Johnson.

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Collaborating on an Joint Expansion in Livingston, Texas

The Texas State University System (TSUS) held a grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony August 14, 2024 to inaugurate the Polk County Center, a joint educational venture in Livingston between Lamar State College Orange, Lamar State College Port Arthur, and Lamar Institute of Technology – known collectively as the Lamar State Colleges.

Starting Fall 2024, the new education center, located in Livingston, will offer a diverse range of courses and training programs offered jointly by the State Colleges, including: Adult Education, Nurse Aide certificate program, Teaching programs, Business programs, Workforce and Continuing Education courses, and CDL/Truck Driving.

"The TSUS Polk County Center looks forward to offering education and technical training for in-demand jobs that lead to high wages and a well-prepared workforce," said Kristin Walker, Executive Director of the Center. "The Polk County Center will be an agent of change, transforming lives through student-centered resources, small class sizes, and affordable tuition.

The grand opening of the Polk County Center, located at 1015 US Highway 59, featured a ribbon-cutting event, tours of the facility, and opportunities to meet the team that will be instrumental in providing high-quality education and training.

To commemorate the installation of the final beam, LSCO hosted a Beam Topping Ceremony for the new, state-of-the-art Academic Center. The \$38 million dollar building will become the largest space on the LSCO campus with the 2-story building occupying 54,821 square feet. Once complete, the Academic Center will include classrooms, student lounge, and lab space while housing

faculty offices and the IT department.

The 87th Legislative session approved the funding of \$38 million dollars with Senate Bill 52 in October of 2021. The building will replace the current Academic Center, one of the oldest buildings on campus built in 1908. A Public Art element will be installed in front of the building titled "We Are the Light."

Members of the community, elected and city officials, staff, faculty, students, and Durotech contractors gathered to celebrate and sign their name on the final beam.

With completion of the Academic Center expected in October 2024, the building has undergone an extensive amount of progress during the summer months after the Beam Topping Ceremony. LSCO looks foward to a grand opening and the building of bright orange futures for our community and beyond.









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Breaking New Ground

Beginning Renovation for the Student Success Center

A Groundbreaking Ceremony for the new Student Success Center was held on February 13, 2024. The historic former First Baptist Church of Orange is undergoing extensive renovations to become LSCO's Student Success Center, a comprehensive hub designed to streamline the enrollment process and support students through their educational journeys. The Student Success Center will house members from the departments of Student Services, Financial Aid, Admissions, Recruiting, and Advising.

The First Baptist Church of Orange was built in 1913 and has sustained heavy damages after numerous hurricanes. In 2021, the building was gifted to LSCO by the Stark Foundation. Funds from a Legislative Appropriations Request of over \$6 million to the state's 88th Legislative Session were granted to restore the facility, shaping the future of the college.

"We're growing by leaps and bounds," said Dade Phelan, District 21 Texas State Representative and 76th Speaker of the Texas House. "We love our students here and are looking forward to the next generation to walk through these doors."

Architects and contractors have approached the project with utmost care to preserve the building's historical prominence by retaining elements such as the stainedglass windows and the building's landmark exterior.

"This moment represents a crucial step forward in our shared vision of transforming lives at LSCO," said Dr. Thomas Johnson, President of Lamar State College Orange. "I'm thrilled to celebrate this exciting development and embrace the opportunities it brings for our college."



Funding the Regional Workforce

Golden Triangle Polymers Company LLC donated \$100,000 to the Lamar State College Orange Foundation to fund the Golden Triangle Polymers Scholarship for students interested in pursuing degrees in industrial systems or pre-engineering.

LSCO's Journey to Reaffirmation 2025

LSCO began the process of reaffirmation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) in the Spring of 2023.

Accreditation is a voluntary process of self-regulation by which institutions conduct self-evaluations according to specified guidelines and then allow themselves to be reviewed by peers to assess the institution's effectiveness in fulfilling its mission, its success in complying with standards set by the accrediting body, and its ongoing efforts toward continuous improvement of the educational programs, services, and quality of student learning.

The resulting awarding or reaffirmation of accreditation serves to assure the public that the institution maintains high standards, operates with integrity, and consistently strives to improve the quality and effectiveness of all its programs and services. LSCO completed a preliminary report in Spring of 2024 and a focused report in early Fall 2024 with the onsite committee scheduled to visit campus on October 27–31, 2024.

2025-2029 Strategic Plam

The 2025–2029 Strategic Planning process began in the Fall of 2023 with the formation of a 20-member committee representing a cross section of LSCO faculty & staff to develop a new strategic plan for the college.

The committee reviewed and revised LSCO's mission and vision statements, as well as identified key strategic goals and actions that the college should focus on over the next five years.
